HIGHLIGHTS

from the Leading Integration Peer Support programme

From January 2022 to March 2024 NHS England commissioned the Leading Integration Peer Support programme (LIPS). A partnership between NHS Confederation, the Local Government Association and NHS Providers, it was designed to provide a range of free, bespoke support to system and place-based partnerships.

Key takeaways

• Relationship building

LIPS has accelerated progress in several areas including how to build a positive culture of collaboration and reaching a shared view on priorities and resources at place and system levels.

Clear, shared vision and priority setting

LIPS has helped ensure that vision and objectives are genuinely co-developed. Several integrated care systems (ICSs) have strengthened their vision with a narrative to engage staff and help with their involvement. This led to new workstreams, strategies, plans, roles, recommendations and priorities.

• Building and accelerating mutual agreement and understanding

Our support facilitated discussions between organisations and within partnerships enabling clarity of roles and responsibilities and ways of working to deliver priorities and agreed action plans.

• Navigating and facilitating change

Our support has helped partners to consider the implications and impact of change and what that means for delivering priorities.

Safe spaces

At a time of record pressures, taking time out to think and the ability to hold in conversations to explore perspectives and expectations was appreciated. Our support stretched thinking – people were not always approaching issues in the same way.

Making connections

LIPS enabled conversations about how different parts of the system and places need to work together in order to drive forward change (mapping strategies and priorities, where conversations were being led etc).

Maintaining relationships and future joint working

There was a strong recognition of the importance of working on the relationships and building trust amongst partners, including creating time and space to develop working relationships.



The support was brilliant – working with peers felt like a two-way street where we were truly co-designing something together.
